Part 2 - Promises, Promises

wenty thousand Extra Police, fifty thousand more nurses, get Brexit done within weeks, reduce taxation, strengthen Britain in the world and while we're at it let's bring world peace.

The words 'truth' and 'economical' spring to mind.

Our NHS: Many of our NHS hospital trusts are being crippled by the Private Finance Initiative. An initial £13bn of private sector-funded investment in new hospitals will end up costing the NHS in England £80bn by the time all contracts come to an end. Twenty years ago PFI was New Labour's magical solution to chronic underinvestment in public services. Sir Howard Davies, chairman of the Royal Bank of Scotland (RBS), made an astonishing admission on BBC1's Question Time when he stated that private finance initiatives (PFI) had been a "fraud on the people". PFI debt for the British taxpayer is more than £300bn for infrastructure projects with a value of £54.7bn. No wonder NHS Trusts are struggling to meet higher demand whilst carrying this financial millstone. Is the NHS safe in Labour's hands?

We can begin reforming this vital public service with these first steps: Abolish all politically imposed hospital targets which distort clinical priorities. Re-open the nursing and midwifery professions to recruitment without the degree requirement, alongside a new nursing qualification in social care. Introduce 24-hour GP surgeries to relieve the strain in A&E departments. Then we need a national debate on our NHS, involving the public alongside MPs, doctors and experts. We should discuss ring-fencing the NHS budget and the tax revenues that pay for it.

Mental healthcare and the Police: Her Majesty's Inspectorate of Police and Fire & Rescue Services produced a report called 'Policing and Mental Health – Picking Up the Pieces' which states "too many aspects of the broader mental health system are broken; the police are left to pick



up the pieces". Over half of all mental health patients who need help in a place of safety are taken there in a police car rather than an ambulance. If as their priority the Police are to combat crime and terrorism, we need to provide rewarding careers for Police Officers, but crucially provide funding to solve the crisis in mental healthcare where Police are often the current frontline.

Defence and National Security: The first duty of a nation is to protect its own people and its borders. Former military and intelligence chiefs at 'Veterans for Britain' are warning us about what's happening behind our backs. Few voters are aware that at the current rate of military integration we can expect an E.U. Common Defence to be established by 2025 with full integration of our armed services by 2027. Whether or not we sign the withdrawal treaty (Boris's deal) or remain in the E.U. control of our armed services and intelligence will be handed to the E.U. Commission.

Foreign Policy: York voters should know that Britain can't pursue an independent foreign policy. The Treaty restricts UK sovereignty by preventing us taking 'any action likely to conflict with or impede' EU foreign policy (Article 129.6) – despite our government having no say in policy making.
